Two Earthquakes India

Latur, 1993

- Loss of over 7,000 lives and 16,000 injured
- 200,000 houses damaged or destroyed
- □ US\$216 million World Bank loan

Gujarat, 2001

- Loss of 20,000 lives and 167,000 injured
- 700,000 houses damaged or destroyed
- US\$400 million World Bank loan and a second-stage US\$442 million World Bank loan

Community participation policy translated as "Owner Driven" program for reconstruction and repair

SSP's Work Experience After Disasters

- > The reconstruction program was in crisis.
- SSP was called in to design and implement a community action strategy centrally involving grassroots women's groups.
- Post-Gujarat earthquake SSP facilitated community to community exchanges.

Women's Groups as Communication Intermediaries

- Motivate house owners
- Build technical capacities
- Demonstrate collective arrangements
- □ Feedback mechanisms
- □ Monitor reconstruction



Women's Groups as Development intermediaries

- Monitor basic services
- Raise women's priorities

- Trigger self-help initiatives
- Facilitate community state dialogue
