## Accomplishments of a Community and Women Centered Approach are Substantial

- Capacities Grow
- Levels of Organization Grow
- Housing, Infrastructure, and Local Decision-Making Includes the Priorities of Women and the Poor
- New Relationships/Dialogues Emerge and Continue
- Increases the Efficiency of Recovery Investment and Expands Social Capital
- Greater Public and Familial Acceptance of Women's Participation
- Creates a Community Culture of Participation
- Women's Groups Can Engage in Long Term Development and Poverty Reduction Initiatives
- Community Resilience Is Strengthened and Vulnerabilities Lessen

## Implementation Choices are Framed by Challenges and Opportunities

- Recovery Programs are Partial and Incomplete and Affected Communities (Especially Women) Must Create Survival Strategies to **Bridge the Gap** and Maintain Their Families.
- Disaster Response can Empower and Support the **Priorities** and Initiatives of Women (and Underwrite Longer-Term Social Change and Development).

## 3 New Operating Principles for Recovery and Practices are Required

- 1. A Human Settlements Approach is Crucial To Including Affected Communities, Organized Groups of Women, and Addressing Housing, Infrastructure, Livelihoods and Secure Tenure.
- Community Expertise, Priorities, and Implementation
   Capacity Must be Given Equal Value and
   Resources
   Must Be Allocated for Community Planning,
   Programming, and Management.
- 3. Recovery and Risk Reduction Require a Long-Term
  Development Response and Sustained Investments in
  Community Based, Women-Led Development Programs.

## Some of the Immediate Strategies That Can be Applied:

- Create Public Spaces that Women's Groups Control and Operate
- Resource and Support Grassroots Women's Groups to Self-Organize Around Basic Needs
- Engage Community Women in Housing Repair,
   Reconstruction, Applying Safety Standards, and in the
   Technical Training of Communities
- Create Government Protocols to Recognize and Sustain Women's Involvement
- Restructure Roles of Communities, Governments, Technical Experts, and Funders to Foster Participation, Collaborative Decision-Making, and Equitable Resource Flows
